Mr Wong is a Registered Clinical Counselor in British Columbia, Canada and runs a small private practice in the treatment of behavioral addictions in Vancouver, BC. He also serves as staff clinician at Richmond Addiction Services Society, one of a handful of publicly-funded sites in Canada that offer counseling to individuals and families affected by problem video gaming. Prior to addictions work, he held clinical and leadership positions in vocational rehabilitation and school counseling. He advocates for parental involvement from early infancy in a child's development, and the responsible use of electronic screens to enhance learning, social skills, resilience and mental health fitness. Mr Wong completed undergraduate training at the University of British Columbia in Vancouver and graduate training in counseling psychology at Colorado Christian University in Denver, CO. He resides in White Rock, BC with his wife and two sons.
