MAKING A DIFFERENCE FOR PROBLEM GAMBLERS

PHOENIX – Governor Janice Brewer has declared March 6-12 Arizona Problem Gambling Awareness Week. The Arizona Office of Problem Gambling (“OPG”) will host a day-long symposium in Phoenix on Monday, March 7, to address this important topic and inform the general public and behavioral therapists about the effects of problem gambling.

"Regulated gambling helps fund valuable programs for the Tribes and the State of Arizona, but there are social costs involved," said Mark Brnovich, Director of the Arizona Department of Gaming. "This symposium will help raise awareness of problem gambling issues and let people know where to go if they need help."

Contrary to stereotypes, problem gambling is often not a life-long issue, but something that can emerge for anyone who starts to make irresponsible decisions regarding gambling. "While problem gambling is a year-round concern, this week is especially useful to focus public attention on the disorder affecting 2-3% of the adult population," said Rick Pyper, Director of OPG. "If you have this condition or are close to somebody who does, it can be devastating."

This year's event will feature keynote speaker Dr. Jeffrey Marotta, Clinical Consultant with Problem Gambling Solutions and Clinical Associate Professor at Oregon Health and Sciences University. He developed and directed the State of Oregon's highly acclaimed problem gambling treatment and prevention system and has produced more than 100 professional presentations and publications on problem gambling-related topics. Jeffrey will speak on "Voices of Problem Gambling Recovery: Consumers as Advocates and Educators."

The symposium, "Making a Difference in an Unpredictable Climate," will be held March 7 at the Black Canyon Conference Center. The event is open to the public and especially recommended for professionals and students working in or studying the helping professions.
