FLAGSTAFF, Ariz. – **Aug. 7, 2007**– The Arizona Office of Problem Gambling (OPG) in partnership with the Flagstaff Medical Center, is offering a unique, day-long workshop on Aug. 30 focused on the prevalence and assessment of problem gambling and traditional healing methods. This distinctive educational workshop will be led by Joanna Franklin, a 27-year veteran and expert in multicultural gambling addiction.

"Problem gambling is ever-evolving; therefore, it's critical to dissect the issues of the condition as it lives in today's society and discover the best methods for healing," said Rick Pyper, director for Arizona Office of Problem Gambling. "Joanna Franklin is North America's most sought after trainer and we are proud to offer her expertise during this powerful workshop designed to equip participants with the necessary assessment and treatment tools."

With a shortage of counselors in rural Arizona, the OPG sought to bring Ms. Franklin to teach this seminar to those professionals within the industry who can benefit and ideally inspire others to work in these underserved areas. Franklin's indepth knowledge of pathological gambling derives from more than 27 years of extensive experience working with state governments, casino and racing industries, state lotteries, and federal agencies.
